Pastor's Page

Our Daily Rituals – Morning Prayer

Last month in The Chimes, we talked about why it's important to take time and remember our Baptisms first thing in the morning and in moments where we are in need of respite and peace. This month, I'd like to offer to you a morning prayer. My seminary shared a campus with an Anglican seminary, and the Anglicans start every morning with morning prayer. It's a beautiful service and a beautiful discipline. It's peaceful and somber and centering, and for many, many people it is exactly how they want to start their day in front of the Lord. There is a place for somberness, there is a place for quiet, peaceful introspection, and sometimes that truly fills our hearts. But often times, I need joy. I need the type of morning worship that prompts me to sing, prompts me to laugh, prompts me to dance before the altar of the Lord. I have been on a quest to figure out what my morning prayer should look like, and I've finally settled on a camp blessing that has become very dear to me called the "Johnny Appleseed Blessing." (If you'd like to listen to the tune of this prayer, you can find it on youtube as "Johnny Appleseed Song." It's the cartoon video!) The words of this sung blessing are:

> "Oh, the Lord's been good to me, And so I thank the Lord! For giving me the things I need, Like the sun and the rain and the apple tree. The Lord's been good to me! Amen, Amen, Amen, Amen, Amen, Aaaaaaaaaamen!"

My last summer at camp, we sang this prayer every Thursday morning, bright and early, right at the crack of dawn. It was the blessing of choice before taking kids on our weekly white water rafting outing. It's the blessing we pray when we want to make sure the waters are high, but not too high. It's the blessing we pray when we want to make sure that our picnic lunch doesn't get soggy while we travel through rapids to our picnic spot. It's the blessing we pray when we want to ask for safety and joy as we go out and play in God's creation. It's not so much good luck and we really aren't asking God for any one thing in particular. Instead, this prayer is a loud, joyful, unapologetic acknowledgement of how good God is and the many, many ways he provides for us. This blessing is just the familiar words of the Lord's prayer, "Give us this day our daily bread," set to a jaunty tune that gets stuck in your head and has you humming all day long. We all look fine on the outside. But what is going on inside our minds? Are we our normal, cheerful selves? Are we depressed? Do we get upset easily? Do we cry more easily? Did we indulge during the stay at home and need to work on our eating habits? Did we let physical exercise go?

We know as a church how much we missed congregating together on Sunday am and seeing our church family. We missed the liturgy and ritual of the service. We missed singing hymns and praise songs on Sunday mornings with our people of faith. The men missed their Thursday am breakfasts and messages. Our women missed the wonderfully delightful summer Bible studies. And the kids!! Our kids missed out on many messages of faith and being together.

We all just plainly missed fellowship as we isolated at home.

I believe that all of us have something inside we will need to fix...either from this pandemic or from something else. From old traumas or from new traumas.

Find a friend to talk through this. It is the PHYSICAL distancing and masking that is important...not being socially distanced which implies for us to pull away and not communicate.

Find a therapist to talk through this. The therapist will not fix your problems but will help you sort through your thoughts to untangle them.


I know that I will be making my appointments to help me heal my mind, body and spirit. Will you??

This car. This car did its job. It has taken me many miles and it kept me safe in an accident – a T-bone hit on the passenger side in a hit and run last week. And it still ran enough for me to pull it off to the side of the road.

On the surface, it doesn't look like it was a very bad hit but the car was mortally wounded. Air bags deployed. OnStar alerted to ask if I was in an accident and wanted 911 called. When you opened the two passenger doors the first time you could see the car settle and twist into an odd shape.

The doors didn't close properly after that. The damage was hidden. But it had a mortal wound internally that was too great to fix.

Don't get me wrong, I was hurt a little. I knew I would be sore and my seat belt raspberry would take weeks to fade. I knew from another hit and run 22 years ago that this would be the recuperation course for the post-accident period but I took a different tack this time for my recovery. Instead of staying home for 2 weeks, we had the car towed to Pete's where we emptied the car, went to the rental car company and back to work I went. And I worked my way through the week. I didn't give in to the soreness or the PTSD while driving that had happened 22 years ago. I do know that I am one of the fortunate ones to walk away from an accident.

And I am better for it this time. Some soreness remains. My raspberry started fading the next day and is almost gone. I still am fearfully cautious at intersections but I am still going. This time I am running towards recovery.

And now on to the real message...

We have taken a direct hit on our minds, bodies and spirits during the past 7 months. The thing about singing this prayer before we hopped on the Nolichucky river, is you really need a reminder of how good God is when you're about to do something like white water rafting. Water might

seem innocent, but then its taking you fast down the river and bumping you into boulders that threaten to capsize your rubber raft or launching you into the air off of "Rooster Tail Rapid." You need that reminder of God's goodness to settle your stomach when you're surrounded by the beauty and danger of God's creation and you're



having to trust your guide to navigate you through the choppy waters, and in the midst of fear, you need to be able to laugh. The thing about rafting is at least you know what the dangers are. The gear is always in top shape and the rapids are all mapped out and labeled. The thing about our day to day life is it can be a little less predictable than a rushing river. We never know what we face in our day. We don't always see the drops or the sharp turns coming, and sometimes we're caught entirely unprepared, but the good news is: even in the midst of unpredictability and danger, God is still good. God is still looking at us and providing daily bread in the form of physical blessings we may rejoice in, but also in the form of spiritual provision. There is sun and rain, yes, but there is also friends and family and church and scripture and a million little ways the Lord offers us comfort and joy.

The past seven months of pandemic have reminded me that we don't always see the rapids that threaten to tip us over and that life doesn't stop when waters get rocky, but living in a world where we have real and imagined fears in front of us doesn't mean that we have to retreat into somber, quiet, mournful places. It's okay to greet the sun (or your alarm clock if you're blessed enough to sleep in) with words of joy and thanksgiving in anticipation for the ways that the Lord will fill our bellies and our souls with good things and settle the storms around us. Morning prayer for me has become a time of thanksgiving and happiness and song, where I look up to the sky and I sing, "Oh, the Lord's been good to me!"

Last week I met with our Central Pacific Team, and Mary Bates, our national coordinator. We discussed the job specs as well as opportunities to help out. Our Relief Team has a 4 part mission:

- 1. Case Management
- 2. Spiritual Christian Care
- 3. Volunteer Response
- 4. Long Term Recovery

As we look around California, we see many disaster zones. Where do we start? I will be coming up with opportunities for our congregation to help others around us in need. Both Auburn and St Timothy's (Pastor Jonna's church) have areas around them directly affected by fire. Our own Syd and Andrea lost their home to fire and Richard and Allyson Kahn lost their cabin.

I need to discuss with council my ideas and will get back to you with areas for you to help out, but for now, Mary Bates asked if we could collect Bibles.

When do you need the scripture the most? When disaster upends your life. NALC Disaster Response makes it a priority to hand out bibles to individuals and families who are going through a disaster. We collect them throughout the year so we have them when disaster strikes. We are collecting bibles to give out to disaster victims.

But did you know that the General Grant Tree is also the only living shrine dedicated to those who have given their lives for our country? That designation came from President Eisen-

hower in 1956, marked by a ceremony on Veterans Day that year.

Unlike the Christmas ceremony, however, the Veterans Day ceremony was forgotten, until a park ranger, along with the help of the American Legion in Squaw Valley, revived it five years ago. Each year now, members of the American Legion conduct a short 15-minute ceremony at the base of the tree at 11:11 a.m. on Nov. 11.
