# Pastor's Page

## The Seventh Commandment

When my brother was two or three years old, my family was walking through the mall. It was the height of the Beanie Baby craze, and right next to the foodcourt was a kiosk overflowing with the most popular toy of the 90s. As we passed by the kiosk, Tucker's eyes landed on a pug. This wasn't a regular beanie baby. It was about the size of a football, and stuffed full of cotton, making him round and huggable. Tucker reached out, snatched the toy, and tucked it under his arm. "This Fatso. He mine," he said and took off running as fast as his little toddler legs would take him. My parents were left stunned. Their toddler was running through a crowded mall, but they didn't want to take off after him and have the kiosk employees think this was an elaborate shop lifting scheme. Eventually, my mom ran after my brother while my dad paid for Fatso. I'm sure that Tucker was scolded, but, perhaps in the spirit of forgiveness and grace, I also know that Fatso was one of his most beloved toys throughout his childhood.

Of course, stealing isn't normally this cute, but I use this story to illustrate what many parents and older siblings learn soon after having a small child in their lives. Children have to be taught not to steal. When we are brought into this world, we are used to having all that we need given to us: food, drink, shelter, clothes. When we discover that everything in the world does not belong to us, it can be jarring. Envy and thievery are the cause of most playground scraps and conflict between siblings. "That shovel is mine now." "I want that bucket for myself." "You should give me your crackers." It's a familiar source of conflict, but as we're taught to respect other people, we begin to learn that not everything belongs to us and we learn that stealing isn't just wrong, but it also feels bad when it happens to us.

But now we are more than children, and there's another lesson to be learned here. What our neighbors have are given to them by our Lord, and so we don't take it from them, and as Christians, we're called to go one step further: we help them protect what has been given to them. Stealing is not always as simple as taking something and running as quick as our legs will take us. Stealing can creep in other ways: hoarding our excesses and not sharing with the community, not paying someone fairly, and turning a blind eye when someone is taking from our neighbor. The command not to steal is a command to reorient our hearts towards generosity, a willingness to recognize what we can give and

self, the unfading beauty of a gentle and quiet spirit, which is of great worth in God's sight." 1 Peter 3:3-4 (NIV 1984)

We can easily spend more time decorating our house to look like the holiday edition of a magazine than we do adorning our inner spirit with God's love and compassion. Let's ask God to make our hearts beautiful by giving us His patience and kindness. Then let's look for ways to bless those around us, especially those in need.

### C – CHEERFULLY CELEBRATE THE SEASON

"A happy heart makes a face look cheerful. But a sad heart produces a broken spirit." Proverbs 15:13 (NIV)

As gift lists grow and calendars get full, our physical and emotional energy can be drained. Although Christmas is meant to be a joyous season, many of us struggle with depression and discouragement during this time of the year. Let's take time each day to focus on how much we are valued and loved as children of God. The holidays are merely a season, but God's love and compassion for us are permanent.

### O – OVERJOYED not OVERWHELMED

"When they saw the star, they were overjoyed. On coming to the house, they saw the child with his mother Mary, and they bowed down and worshiped him. Then they opened their treasures and presented him with gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh." Matthew 2:10-11 (NIV)

Do you ever feel overjoyed to kick off the holiday season but overwhelmed by the middle of the month? If we take time each day in December to thank Jesus for coming as our Savior, we could become overwhelmed by His kindness instead. When we focus our hearts on all God has done, we won't get as easily overwhelmed by all that still needs to be done.

### A – ABUNDANCE

"...I came that they may have life, and have it to the full." John 10:10b (NIV)

Whenever I think of Christmas mornings from my childhood to the present, the word ABUNDANCE comes to mind. Abundance of presents, food and activities. But these things are temporary. What we need is the abundant life Jesus came to give us. Our hearts need His mercy, peace and love, not only on Christmas day, but every day throughout each year.

I don't know about you, but I'm ready for a cup of Christmas cocoa. Will you join me? Let's take time to ponder these Christmas truths and, as that chocolaty goodness warms us, let's allow the warmth of God's love to pour into our hearts and His abundant goodness to pour out into the lives of those around us.

*Dear Lord, thank You for giving me the gift of Your Son. Please help me not get so caught up in the earthly celebrations of Christmas that I forget to celebrate all I have in Christ. Remind me of Your love each day and show me how to share it with others each day of this month. In Jesus' Name, Amen.*

*"They celebrate your abundant goodness and joyfully sing of your righteousness."*

*Psalm 145:7 (NIV)*

She, of course, wanted to be at home, but she came to accept Bethel Lutheran Home. We have nothing but good to say about Bethel and the kindnesses and love they showed her. From the administrator to housekeeping, they all knew everyone's name and always took the time to stop and say hi and wish her well. Thank you Bethel.

A couple of weeks ago we, Immanuel, baptized my daughter (in law) and my granddaughter. What a wonderful day. What a joy to receive the gift of God's promise to always be with us. 
