

Return Service Requested

From our Pastor

My junior year of high school, one of my dearest friends was getting her masters in religion at the university of Georgia and my parents agreed to allow me to shadow her classes during my spring break. I sat in a theology class, taught by Dr. Richard Friedman, the professor of Jewish studies and the author of many books and even a consultant on the DreamWorks film "Prince of Egypt." While sitting in his class on the book of Job, one of the students asked him with no small amount of confrontation, how he knew God existed. Dr. Friedman did not hesitate. He turned from the board and fixed his eyes on the student. "Reese's cups."

The student laughed. "What?"

"Reese's cups. Peanuts grow from the ground. Cocoa grows from trees. We could get into the nitty-gritty of the sugar and water involved with the process but the point I'm trying to make is this: both of these things grow from the ground. Both of them taste fine—good even when they're on their own, but when you combine them, they're delicious. Reese's cups are how I know God exists."

"I'm being serious." The student protested.

"So am I," Dr. Friedman replied, and he turned back to the board.

You may be able to tell from the amount of food illustrations I use in my sermons that this interaction had a profound impact on my seventeen-yearold mind, but there is a sincere theology in what Dr. Friedman provided the class that day. The Lord has provided us our daily peanut butter and chocolate, he has provided for us our daily bread. We have been entrusted with gardens and livestock and waterways that we cultivate and care for but we did not first create. When we turn to the Lord in prayer, asking that he give us our daily bread, we are asking that once again, the Lord would allow us to wake up in the world he designed, where trees and plants breathe out what we need to breathe and breathe in what we cannot, where the sun and rain alike would provide growth for our food, and where our needs, though not always our desires, would be provided for by the Lord once again in abounding generosity. If we pray this prayer daily, we are recognizing that the Lord hears our needs and desires, and all that we have been given comes to him.

But there is no mistake that this petition is next to a petition for forgiveness. "And forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us." As necessary as bread, as vital as peanut butter and chocolate, is our daily need for repentance and forgiveness. We cannot live on bread alone, but we do live on the grace of God. We return each day with the acknowledgement that we need forgiveness. Our sin seeks to harden our





Journey

So I'm ready to circle back to the subject at hand, grief.

Grief is the state of emotion that one becomes immersed in when a loved one passes. This is the kind of grief that I mostly deal with here. However, there are many things that we can grieve; pets, lost jobs, lost health, lost homes and people who are living and yet have veered away from our lives. Cats in The Cradle syndrome. I think we all have those who we were close to that have simply fallen off the radar. I get all of those griefs and I've experienced most of them. But I'd like to go back to the loss of a loved one by death. July 8th 2016, 9:15pm is when my grief began. You can think I'm crazy, but I was there, and as amazing as it was to witness her spirit rise up out of her body, a piece of my spirit left as well. And the piece that floated back into that hole was grief. Grief is that pain that used to be an ever present thorn in the flesh. I don't know that it's "better" but I have gotten used to its shadow.

It's widely accepted that there are seven stages to grief. Shock, anger, bargaining, depression, acceptance and hope. Processing the grief. I've found that in general they are true. But I can tell you they aren't definite. You aren't shocked for three weeks, then you shift into anger, and then to bargaining, etc. It just doesn't work that way. Grief is as individual as each of us is an individual. You may experience shock and anger together. You may be depressed at the same time you begin to accept. You may skip a step or repeat a step. You may get bogged down in step or never make it past a step.

What you need to know is that however you work through it, it's your process and no one else's. Don't feel guilty if you aren't angery. Don't let anyone tell you that you are wrong. You are only wrong if you attempt to medicate your way through it with drugs or alcohol. And, of course, self harm is a sign to you that you need professional help, NOW.

Grief is traumatic! It takes time to process. Don't rush, give yourself the gift of time and patience. Seek out those of us who are on the same path you find yourself on. We'll listen! We'll share our thoughts. We'll pray with you and for you. Find ways to connect with other people. Don't spend so much time alone, that can be one of my down falls. God put us in communities because he knew we would need each other. Church is a great community. Not just the building but the fellowship of other God loving and worshiping people. Join a community that seeks to lift all people up and not one that puts others down. If you are grieving, you don't need negativity, you need positive and loving people.

If you are grieving, embrace it. It's a way God has given us to make it through life. I know it hurts. I know the pain. I also know that you're go-
