

From Our Pastor

The Easter Bunny is going to steal your children and turn them into pagans! You heard it here first, folks. I know he looks cute and cuddly but under those whiskers and that cotton ball tale, he's hiding pure evil and temptation.

I'm kidding, of course, but there has been a lot of discourse around Easter being a pagan holiday in disguise, and with the Lenten season just around the corner, I thought I'd take the opportunity to dispel some myths about Easter. The first is an issue of timing. Christmas takes place around the winter solstice, and Easter, in turn, takes place around the Spring Solstice. This has led to rumors in recent history that Easter was another attempt by the church to swallow up a pagan holiday (like the feast of Eostre, but more on her in a little bit). Now this is the part of the article where I could choose to regale you about the history of the church. I could point to the fact that Easter is actually the earliest church holiday and has been celebrated since at least the 2nd century. I could point to the fact that the date was so essential to early Christians that it was talked about at the Council of Nicaea. I could point to written arguments between the western and eastern church about when exactly we should celebrate, but I'm not going to do any of that. I'm going to point you to scripture itself. In the Gospel of Matthew, as Matthew begins to describe the last supper, he writes, "On the first day of the Festival of Unleavened Bread, the disciples came to Jesus and asked, 'Where do you want us to make preparations for you to eat the Passover?'" (Matt. 26:17). The last supper, the last meal that Jesus shared with his disciples before his crucifixion took place at the same time as the Passover celebration of the Jewish people, and it was the Jewish lunar calendar that helped early Christians determine when to celebrate Easter—not the pagan traditions. In fact, the Latin and Greek name for the holiday Pascha, is the same word used to refer to the Jewish holiday of Passover.

So let's take a look at the English name for Easter. You may have seen a Facebook post or received a chain email or even heard a particularly fiery televangelist insist that we should stop celebrating Easter because it's a celebration of either Ishtar, a Mesopotamian goddess, or Eostre, the pagan goddess of spring, disguised as a Christian holiday. First, no credible historian will link Ishtar to the Easter holiday. The only tie is the similarity of the name. Taylor Swift and I have the same first name, but I'm not selling out stadiums and breaking album sales. Let's address the more popular Eostre. The argument tying this goddess to Easter hinges around the writings of a pagan theologian in 1874, a good seven-teen centuries after Easter began being celebrated. Adolf Holtzman, who

was writing with the explicit purpose of bolstering the survival of paganism, used the existence of the Easter Bunny tradition and the similarity of the names to link this goddess and Easter together. Unfortunately for Holtzman, the overwhelming consensus of historians agree that the name for Easter comes from the Germanic word, "austrá" or "eostre," which translates to the word "dawn." Images of dawn, or the rising of the sun, have been popular Easter motifs because Easter is a celebration of the rising of the Son from the dead. The name of our most popular feast can't be credited to a pagan goddess, but it can be credited to a pun.

So what about the pesky little Easter Bunny. Adolf Holtzmann, in his attempt to further bolster claims that Easter was tied to Eostre, appealed to supposed images of the goddess Eostre, which included images of rabbits. About ten years after the publishing of this article, in the year 1889, an American folk-lore journal published a story explaining the affection German immigrants had for the Easter Bunny. They offered a story of Eostre turning a bird into a bunny, which caused the creature to be quite upset. To make it up to him, she allows him one day a year to lay eggs. This is the earliest documentation we can find tying this funny little critter to Eostre, and if we take it at face value it would seem that this cute mascot may be a pagan sleeper-agent, even if our holiday is decidedly Christian.

So what do we do with the Easter bunny? Well, first, we should recognize that the Easter Bunny isn't a Christian symbol. He never has been. The ancient church didn't treat him that way and we certainly shouldn't either. He won't be making appearances in our sanctuary or Easter sunrise service, and we shouldn't allow any argument that hinges on his existence to effect how we view Easter. He's always been a fun little extra thing, like Christmas stockings or secular music; things that aren't religious, but are a lot of fun. We should also take the myths that tie his origin to Eostre with a grain of salt. A lot of secular historians are divided on the existence of any worship of Eostre or an existing tradition of her prior to the 1800s. Many historians actually believe that she was fabricated by the neo-pagan and New Age movement, ironically, to discredit Easter. You can find a ton of information about this on the Library of Congress' website if, like me, you are a huge nerd.

So how did we get this hippity, hoppity, egg laying fella? I want you to consider what things you associate with the different seasons. Pumpkins and red leaves for fall, pine trees and snowflakes for winter, sunshine and dragonflies for summer, and flowers and bumblebees for spring. These associations aren't new. Our world changes with the seasons and new things appear. Eggs, baby animals, sprouting plants, and yes, bunny rabbits, have long been associated with spring because spring is a season of growth and

birth for the world around us. For most Germanic people, the emergence of rabbits during the day for the mating season was the first indication that the winter world was thawing for spring. In other parts of Europe, the association was different. Cuckoo birds bring eggs and treats in Switzerland and in Westphalia the eggs are brought by foxes. It's just as likely that the egg-laying rabbit wasn't so much paganism as he was an enduring part of seasonal décor and celebrations, like jack-o-lanterns and sunflowers in the fall. The rabbit is out, the hens are laying, and it's time to celebrate the arrival of spring.

Of course, if you find yourself viewing his long ears and cotton tail as a stumbling block, feel free to toss him aside, but don't toss Easter morning out with him. Instead, let us give thanks that the fathers and mothers of our faith recognized the need for us to gather together, every year on Easter morn and celebrate once more the defeat of sin and death and the dawn of a new age. Let us gather together with the apostles and second-century Christians and nineteenth-century saints and all those faithful believers who have gone on before us and rejoice that the Son of God has risen.


Soup Suppers & Lenten Services

Fresno Mission Volunteer Update

Hello everyone!

2023 is off to a great start for the Mission on groups serving and getting plugged in. We are seeing God work in many ways for individuals to come alongside and use their time, talents and treasures to support us.

In 2022, we had around 1700 individuals call the Mission “home” for weeks to months as we were able to help Rescue, Restore, and Empower through Christ-centered communities of transformation. We served over 400,000 meals and had weekly bible studies, and chapel services in the mornings and afternoons throughout our campuses.

In 2023, we are going to be expanding and creating new serving opportunities to add to our already 38 daily opportunities. We will be updating you regularly of those opportunities and how to sign up. We are no longer doing in-person orientations; we are set to launch in February our Online Orientation. We will email everyone when it is available so that you can forward it to people who wish to complete our orientation or, if you have not completed orientation, you can also complete it.

Areas of need:

For Groups-- If you are interested in having your group participate in one of these opportunities, please email volunteers@fresnomission.org
Group Outreach Meals: Bring your group to help us build 300-500 meals for outreach that will be provided for Saturday Sports for ENP on Fridays from 6pm-8pm. We ask for you to commit to 3 months of a specific Friday evening.

Friday Activity Nights: We have an open weekend for a group to come out on Fridays to Family Center and participate in activity nights, walking alongside the mission and preparing a fun evening. Your group would be responsible for all aspects of the evening from items, games, snacks, etc.
