#### From our Pastor

Where do we find community?

Church attendance is on the decline. Spin cycle classes are on the rise.

I had a friend remark once that her spin cycle class was kind of like her church. She grew up attending church and enjoying it, but as she grew older and transitioned out of youth group, she found herself isolated in what had once been a thriving community. This issue was only made worse because she was single while her peers were married and joining young couples' classes. Eventually, she just stopped going altogether. Spin class was different. She could go and cry and scream and then, at the end of it, everyone introduced themselves and community began to form. She didn't feel like she had to check a demographic box to belong. She just had to show up.

In a world where we are increasingly isolated and polarized, community is our most scarce resource and the most difficult to cultivate. But community isn't just important, it's holy. When the Lord first formed us in his image, he knew Adam couldn't live in isolation and so he created Eve as well. We have a tendency to think of this solely as a romantic partnership, but far before romance ever entered into the picture, the observation God made was simply, "It's not right for man to be alone." From the very first moments of creation, we've needed each other. In the face of our neighbors, we see God's own image reflected back to us, and God in his wisdom established the church so that when we gather to worship we gather in community. We can rely on the faith of our neighbors to carry us through joy and sorrow alike. We can hear God's love and see his grace in those around us. Church at its best becomes a place where we say, "it's not right to be alone, so come take a seat here."

So what about my friend, then? Where did the church go wrong?

I think we tend to fall into two traps. First, we view community as a commodity to consume and commodities need to be marketed and marketing needs an audience. Consider how many classes and Bible studies are often geared towards specific demographics. This class is for this age range or this gender or people in this stage of life. Some of this is helpful! It's great to give young parents or widows and widowers a chance to talk to people who are going through similar things, but un-



less you have a staff of a hundred people leading small groups, someone is going to inevitably not fit in the right box and feel left out. That's why it's important to make sure we view the church as a whole as a community and give us the opportunity to break barriers—like we strive to do with Ummata every year. We need to be in relationships with people who don't just look like us and talk like us because it gives a fuller picture of the world and, if we believe that each of us is created in the image of God, it gives us a fuller picture of God too. In spin class, my friend was shaking hands with businessmen and teachers and models and she loved that no one was asking her to go cycle next to the other nurses.

The second trap churches fall too is a lot sneakier. We already have established communities. We have our groups that we gravitate to, and so it's harder to notice when people are left out. It can even be uncomfortable when people try to join. We view it as an intrusion. We're happy to have folks in church! We'll welcome them and give them a slice of cake! But inviting them to *our* class or *our* group, well that's too far, but it's not enough to be welcoming if we aren't making space in our lives for those we invite in. You wouldn't invite someone to dinner and then make them eat at another table or invite a friend to spin class and never talk to them while they're there. Church has the opportunity to be a place where people find belonging, but if we aren't willing to invite people into new spaces—our spaces—it'll never be the community it can be.

What's amazing about serving in Immanuel is I have been adopted into your community and it's given me a family away from home. I know firsthand how wonderful this church can be, and as an outsider who was brought in, I know building and maintaining community is a team sport. It's not something that can be done by a single pastor or just a few people. It's a whole church reaching out, shaking hands, and inviting people to experience not just Sunday morning but life together. It's not good that we should be alone, so let us rejoice that the Lord has made us to be together.

It is time for our District's second annual mission trip! Scheduled for the third week of July, beginning Sunday afternoon, **July 16th and ending the morning of Saturday, July 22nd.** For those of us who took part in last year's Lake Madrone trip, you'll remember how rewarding it was helping others in a burn area and making new friends. Victoria Thornton, one of last years participants from St. Timothy, wrote a wonderful recount of the trip from her perspective, see her recount below.

This year we are also helping those who have lost their homes and possessions due to fire, but in two separate areas of Northern California. On Sunday, the 16th, we will be heading to the mountain town of Somerset as the Pioneer Bible Church will be our accommodations for the evenings of Sunday, Monday and Tuesday. Work will take place in Grizzly Flats, helping rebuild a home under construction. Wednesday, after breakfast, we will make our way to Volcanoville to build a storage shed for a fire victim, then making our way to our Foresthill Church, New Hope, that will serve as our hotel for the next three nights. Construction help will take place in Michigan Bluff, about a twenty minute ride from Foresthill, one day, and the other day will be working at the Church.

This wonderful opportunity of working within communities affected by wildfire, is open to youth and adults. Participate the entire week or part. All meals are provided and will be at the approximate cost of \$125.00 per person for the week, or pro-rated per participation time. More details will be forthcoming as we nail them down.
