The Fun in Funerals

"Alright, who wants to die!" I immediately raised my hand. This is as good of a summation of my seminary experience as you're likely to find.

We were going over occasional services in my liturgy class. So far, we had practiced baptism on a teddy bear and a married couple in my class had received a free, impromptu vow renewal. Now, we needed a dead body for a funeral, and I was ready to volunteer. Dr. Schifrin, my liturgy professor, had me walk to the back of the church, where I stood in the entrance, a very mobile "corpse" flanked by my "pall bearers."

"Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the source of all mercy and the God of all consolation. He comforts us in all our sorrows so that we can comfort others in their sorrows with the consolation we ourselves have received from God." My friend Colin proclaimed hands spread apart as a dutiful priest would. "Thanks be to God," my classmates replied. "I'm really relieved about my untimely demise," I whispered as we walked down the aisle. "I was stressed about the Greek exam."

One of my pallbearers rolled his eyes, which I felt is rude. People should laugh at your jokes at your own funeral. That should be a rule. This was fun and games as Dr. Schifrin had me lay down at the front of the nave before the little steps. I crossed my arms over my chest as she began to explain the pall. I think many people assume "pall bearer" means "coffin carry-er" or something akin to that, but a pall is actually a white cloth that is used to cover the casket. For centuries that was the practice. Flowers, flags, and pictures were all saved for the visitation or the graveside. In the sanctuary the casket was just adorned with a plain white cloth. It's a representation of the baptismal cloth. It was placed on every casket when it arrived before the altar, as a reminder that every single person, rich or poor, man or woman, pastor or laity, is the same as they laid before the Lord. We only have one hope and one redeemer in this moment.

As the body is covered with the pall, the pastor reads a promise, "When we were baptized in Christ Jesus, we were baptized into his death. We were buried therefore with him by Baptism into death, so that as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might live a new life. For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we shall certainly be united with him in a resurrection like his."

My classmates pantomimed covering me with a white sheet as Colin reaffirmed this baptismal promise for me, and this silly little exercise stopped being so silly. Here I am, laying flat on my back, probably wearing a Hawaiian shirt, in the middle of a church, and my breath is catching in my throat as a fake pall settles on my face.

We talk a lot about how funerals are for "the living," and that's true. We gather together to grieve and hold each other. We tell stories about those we

mourn and we laugh and sing songs. We do these rituals to provide comfort, but as Christians funerals are so much more than a chance to remember someone who means a lot to us. Funerals are a chance to worship a living God who shows up in the midst of grief to comfort those who cry out for him. Funerals are a chance for us to hear once more the promises God made to Abraham and David and Peter and Paul and to you and to me. As Christians, we should know that when we say that funerals are for the living, we do not just mean those mourners in the pews, but those saints who we cover softly with palls and commend to the hands of the Lord.

It's a beautiful thing to hear about the new life we are promised in Christ as you lay in your grave. I remember thinking, as Colin went on with my funeral service and the class discussed appropriate hymns and readings, that every Christian should have this opportunity. Then I was giggling as I realized that part of what we believe is that every Christian will in fact be given exactly that—in a moment, in the twinkling of an eye. Death will be swallowed up in victory, drowned in the waters of baptism, covered by the faultless pall of Christ. I can't earn that. Not by passing my Greek exams or making my pall-bearers laugh or through works of righteousness. Neither can I squander it through sin or snide remarks or carelessness. This is the promise we are given as those who were dead in sin, but made alive in the righteousness of Christ. This is the promise we are given as those who were dead in the grave, but pulled into the new life of the resurrection by the pierced hands of our savior.

"Into your hands, O merciful Savior, we commend your servant, Taylor. Acknowledge, we humbly beseech you, a sheep of your own fold, a lamb of your own flock, a sinner of your own redeeming. Receive her into the arms of your mercy, into the blessed rest of everlasting peace, and into the glorious company of the saints in light. Amen."

Colin read the commendation of the dead, his hand hovering over me, dead in sin. Then he offered me a hand and pulled me up out of my grave. This is as good of a summation of what the church is meant to be as any you are likely to find, and I returned to the pews, risen from the dead and entrusted to God. My baptism and the new life in Christ that exists there had been affirmed in a service that the world tells us is for death and decay, but for you, my friends, I want you to know that you are the living saints. It's a service of renewal and life.

If you've got a loved one nearby, pull them aside to have them place a hand on your forehead and pray the commendation for you and return the favor for them. If not, place a hand on your heart and entrust yourself to the Lord.

Into your hands, O merciful Savior, we commend your servant, [name]. Acknowledge, we humbly beseech you, a sheep of your own fold, a lamb of your own flock, a sinner of your own redeeming. Receive [him/her] into the arms of your mercy, into the blessed rest of everlasting peace, and into the glorious company of the saints in light. Amen.
