

Pastor's Page

One of my brothers liked to hunt for his Christmas gifts every year. He'd look for them in every nook and cranny of the house. He searched in the attic and under the beds and in the dusty corners of our home. It was an annual ritual I never paid much attention to, until the year he found them. My dad's closet had an upper shelf and for years the gifts had been safely tucked away out of sight and reach of prying eyes, but through sheer will that year, they'd been discovered.

My brother immediately regretted it.

This wasn't the same as shaking wrapped gifts under the tree and trying to guess what their colorful paper hid. It wasn't the same as hunting for answers in hidden corners. Here it was: every answer, every gift, every moment of anticipation was gone. Part of the fun had been the hunt and the buildup and now there was nothing to look forward to. He rushed to the end and he got the answers he wanted—sure, but in the process he realized that part of what made the gifts special was the joy of sharing it in community. Part of what made the gifts special was waiting to see the face of the person who had set it aside for you. Finding these things, he had marked down carefully on a Christmas list out of context made them seem less like gifts and more like a pile of things without meaning.

My parents ended up salvaging the whole ordeal somehow. I think they returned some of the gifts and kept others, so he didn't know what he'd get, and Christmas morning still carried this moment of surprise and joy. My brother never tried to find his gifts before Christmas morning again, though he'd still rattle whatever presents were wrapped up underneath the tree.

I think about this every year as December creeps closer. Somewhere along the way, the season of Advent was gobbled up by Christmas like a child that insists on cracking hard candy between their teeth instead of savoring it on their tongue. Once the Thanksgiving turkey has been carved and the gravy has been soaked up, the eyes of the worship and music committee snap to me and ask "Where is Away in A Manger?" and folks shake my hand a little extra firmly as they walk out of church the first

Sunday in December asking, "Where is Silent Night?" (I notice nobody has asked me why I don't play Jesus Christ Is Risen Today on Good Friday.) We begin searching for Jesus in the closet by the choir room, in dusty wreaths, and old hymnals. We begin trying to pull soft, tender, mild, sweet baby Jesus out from the top of the pastor's closet where she's hidden him away for the season for some reason.

Good.

Maybe that sounds a little sassy, but good. Keep hunting for him. Keep trying to find Jesus. Keep searching for those Christmas Carols. They'll show up, I promise, but the season of Advent is important. It's a season of the hunt. I hope that whenever you desire a Christmas Carol, you are prompted to desire the one they are written for. This is a season of people walking in darkness and searching for the light, and for centuries the church set it aside in hopeful anticipation of our Lord's arrival in the manger and our Lord's triumphant arrival for his throne. This is a season—just four short weeks—set aside for us to realize how desperately we long for our Lord's arrival. How badly do we need God to show up in our lives? How badly do we need not only little baby Jesus surrounded by cattle and making Herod tremble in his castle, but King of Kings Jesus sitting on his heavenly throne and surrounded by the saints to be worshiped and glorified? How badly do we need that hope? How dark was life without it? How sweet is life now that we know what awaits us from the babe born in Jerusalem and the liberating Lord of Lords? Trying to understand Christmas without Advent is like trying to understand Easter without Lent.

Somewhere along the way, the story of scripture stopped dictating how we observed this season and the Hallmark channel did. As soon as Walmart realized they could sell us more stuff if Christmas started the day after Halloween, we signed on. Don't get me wrong. The world is dark and scary and hot cocoa is sweet and I'm going to watch the Christmas Prince and deck the halls as I see fit. That's good! You



should feel free to celebrate and prepare alongside your family and friends too, but it is okay for the church to ask us to have a bit of discipline and wait during our worship. The church—the larger church—asks us to press pause. If we listen to the stories of scripture told around this time of year, we listen to God talking to a broken people. We listen to

God coming to people who are dealing with grief, war, famine, and sin. They have been through it and they feel separated from God. They aren't sure where their hope will be found, but the prophet Isaiah assures us that God hasn't abandoned us. The prophet Isaiah assures us that a messiah is coming. John the Baptist stands on the banks of a river and begins crying the same message of hope and repentance: our God is coming and he is a God that cannot be contained or controlled. Mary the Mother of our Lord cries out with joy that yes, she does know. She knows who she carries in her womb and that when she delivers this child unto the world, she will deliver not just a new life into her family, but a new life to each and every one of us. We listen to a people longing and a God reminding them that they cannot rush him.

Advent is a season of surrender and waiting. It reminds us that we cannot control our God's grand entrance any more than Mary could control when it was that her body first began to labor. We can and should hunt for him. We should search for him in the faces of our neighbors and in the words of his holy scriptures and in the lilting tunes of hymns, but he is not a gift we pull out of a closet on our own timeline. He's a king, and he arrives exactly when he intends to. We await a baby, and we await a risen God. We await a God that was born of the virgin Mary, took on flesh and became man for you and for me, and a God who will come again to judge the living and the dead. We await a God whose kingdom will have no end. We await to welcome him with lullabies and adoration. We await, we long, we hunt for Christmas morning.

The events unfolding throughout our wonderful country, and the world are unsettling. Many of us feel anxious or even fearful as we enter this Christmas season—a season which is intended to offer hope and peace. It is interesting to note that some variation of the phrase "do not be afraid" appears in the Bible approximately 365 times. Our Lord knows our hearts and minds and understands our tendency to feat the unknown. He reminds us, patiently and often, that He is in control.

Today our military veterans, contractors and their families need to hear this Good News now more than ever, especially as we reflect on the fact that the number of veteran suicides continues to increase year after year. Sadly, the fact that the reporting process of veteran suicides is flawed suggests that the numbers are actually worse. Therefore, the mission of this ministry is critical.

At LMVFM, we serve with Christ's love, those who have paid a heavy spiritual and emotional price.

- LMVFM offers free, Christ-centered counseling for individuals and families affected by military service-related post –traumatic stress.
- LMVFM team members travel around the country, training pastors and other professionals and lay caregivers to recognize and respond to the moral and spiritual wounds of war within their congregations and families.
- LMVFM's therapy dogs, members of the 'Paws & Effect' program, work with those we counsel, and assist our training efforts.

As a matter of conscience LNVFM does not take government funds. Our ability to provide counseling and services fro free to veterans, military contractor, or family member is made possible through the generous gifts from supporters like you.

Christmas Offering

Our Christmas offering this year will be going to support the ministry at Iglesia Lutreana Santa Cruz in Santa Maria, California. This congregation was started in 2002 as a Hispanic outreach ministry by Pastor Patricia Muran, and today Pastor Esteban Salazar and his wife, Angie, are serving over five hundred parishioners. Their congregation is predominately made up of Mixteco migrant farmers, who are consistently bringing their entire families to worship on Sunday morning and throughout the week to participate in confirmation classes. This ministry has thrived through the work of the Holy Spirit and the faithful service of pastors like Pastor Patricia and Pastor Esteban and their families, and their willingness to think creatively and engage with the needs and unique challenges of the community around them.

Due to the nature of migrant farming, the parishioners worshipping in this church are not always able to contribute financially. Pastor Esteban encourages the congregation to consider bringing bags of rice, beans, and maseca (corn flour) to share with their neighbors rather than encouraging them to give money they need for rent, and the church collects this food along with hygiene supplies and clothes to redistribute every week to the larger community. They seek to live generously and faithfully in what they've been given.

Of course, this doesn't change the reality that it costs money to run a church. For over twenty years, Iglesia Lutreana, has shared a building with their sister church Bethel Lutheran, Santa Maria, and relied on the support of congregations throughout California to meet the needs of their congregation and pastor. Due to the impact of the severe weather over the past year on the congregants, the need has never been greater in the congregation, and as the church council and as the NALC, we want to make sure this congregation is able to continue to do the important work of the Great Commission—proclaiming the good news of the Gospel and baptizing all those

who gather around the lifesaving word of the Lord in the name of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.

They also have Noble, Douglas and Fraser Firs that will not grow here, (too hot!) shipped in from snow country that range from \$45-\$310 depending on species and size. Their tallest Firs are 10/11' but not too many available.

Maria G. Parra is the owner of PARRA'S MULTISERVICE AGENCY. She is a realtor, tax preparer, notary public and soon will offer fingerprinting services for Live Scan. The building is beautiful inside. It looks a lot different than when it was an auto parts store. Check them out next time you need one of the services they offer.

The next building on the south side is the La Placita Raspondos, it means Shaved Ice in Spanish. This business sits back under a car port area. It's been in business quite a few years now I just thought I should highlight it since it's part of the Elm Ave Strip. Erica owns this business and wow, what a find tucked under the carport. She is open Monday through Friday from 11:00AM-5:00PM and 10:00AM-4:00PM on Saturdays. She sells fresh fruit cups and drinks called Aguas Frescas, she serves 2 different flavors every day and has 20 different flavors that she makes. She bakes cookies and makes tortas daily. She takes orders for tamales on Thursdays for pick up on Fridays. She makes Pork, Corn, and Cheese & Pepper Tamales. She also makes catering trays of rice, beans, Barbacoa and other items. All catering trays must be special ordered. She makes beautiful piñatas and sells the Mexican candy to fill them. It's a lovely store if you like fresh fruit cups, she has them, she keeps busy when the students are in school selling smoothies and lots of fruit. Visit the lovely store soon.

The Indian Furniture Store is in the former Commit to Fit Building. Ravinder Kakker bought the building from Ron Silva 3 years ago. Ravinder and his wife are realtors and moved to Clovis from Florida six years ago. They sell houses and realized that their clients of Indian decent, were not able to find quality furniture that will last for generations. They decided to open a furniture store and sell high quality furniture and draperies imported from India in the large part of the building. Later they hope to open a restaurant in the adjacent area in the building. The furniture is exquisite and very comfortable. They also make and sell outdoor garden boxes and picnic tables. They offer financing as well.
