PASTOR'S PAGE

"What's your dad like?" "Quiet," I said, and then I grinned. "I take after him." My colleagues laughed. Nice try, but they definitely didn't buy that last line.

This question comes up more than you would think around other pastors, and I always find it hard to answer. Growing up, my dad worked hard during the week, and spent every Saturday under a car or in the woods hunting. Sunday he was in church in a blue button-down shirt. He can fix anything. My friends never heard him talk. I know him to be one of the funniest people around.

"Okay, what's one thing your dad taught you?"

"Oh," I paused. I'd forgotten these particular colleagues are also friends, and these are the kind of questions pastor friends ask each other. My dad taught me to change a tire, to bait a hook, to always tip well. My dad has taught me a lot of small things and big things, but there was one thing I wanted these pastors to hear. It's my dad's birthday at the end of January, so there's one thing I want you to hear too. "My dad taught me the meaning of sacrifice. He taught me what it meant to love his family like Christ loved the church."

In Ephesians 5, when Paul writes instructions for Christian households. "Wives submit to your husbands as the church submits to Christ. Husbands love your wives as Christ loved the church." I've heard so many pastors preach sermons and write books about how this version of Biblical manhood means a husband should be willing to die for his wife. They paint fantastic pictures about gunmen storming into the room or a wife needing a kidney, and the husband's heroic sacrifice of the body, "just like Christ." That's cinematic and creates an image of the world where a woman submits to her husband's wisdom daily because he is hypothetically willing to sacrifice himself in a situation that he is highly unlikely to ever be called upon to do.

Let me tell you how Christ loved the church. He abandoned heaven and took on flesh to be to spend time with us. He who created the universe humbled himself that much. He didn't just want to make an appearance. He wanted to live alongside us, at fish fries and wedding feasts and funerals. He looked at the apostles and he recognized their gifts, and he nurtured them, teaching them, forgiving them, encouraging them. From Peter to Paul to Matthew to Mary, Christ encourages and equips those in his

path to serve the kingdom of God. Then in the garden, when Christ himself is afraid of the crucifixion, he prays to the Father for deliverance, but ultimately submits to God's will anyway and dies for us all. Then—most importantly!—rises again. Christ doesn't just die for the church. He lives for it. We do not worship a dead God. We worship a living one. That's kind of the whole point.

My dad is a brilliant engineer and the bread winner of our family. He is indispensable to his company. He's on call all the time, but he also married a woman who he recognized as a brilliant teacher and a coach. He wanted to love her the way Christ loved the apostles. He wanted her to use her gifts to build up children, and the kingdom of God. He was willing to dedicate everything he had to make that as successful as possible. That didn't mean he threw himself in front of a bullet. It meant he took his kids to the ballfield and cheered on his wife even after a long day at the office and commute home. He cooked dinners most nights. He'd do the grocery runs on the way home from work. He'd help my brothers and I wash dishes or vacuum floors. We folded laundry together. (He still hates doing the socks. That was always my job.) Here's the wildest part: my mom never asked him to. He just began doing it, even after long hours, even though he made more money. Even though he was the man. He did this out of a pure, practical, crazy, sacrificial love.

Years later, when my mom answered a call to ministry, my dad's support was as full and sacrificial as it had been when she was coaching long hours. Even when her call took her two hours from home, that love never wavered once. When the world called him crazy, he said that plenty of people had spouses deployed by the military, but his was deployed by God. He was just grateful they got to spend part of their week together. All of those pastors who say biblical manhood is being willing to die for your family aren't entirely wrong. I've watched my father die. He's died a thousand times, for my mom, for my brothers, for me, for his parents, for his in-laws. I've seen him die for strangers on the street. He's died to himself more times than I can count. He dies like Christ in the garden, by asking himself, "What does God want?" and doing it, even when it's not what he wants. He dies asking himself, "What does my family need?" and doing it, even when it's not what he wants. I don't know if "What do I want?" is truly the last question my dad asks himself or if it's just the last question he follows, but I know that's what it means to put yourself to death. That's what it means to love your wife and your family as Christ loves the church.

Please don't read this and think my father's life has only been suffering. There has been hunting and fishing and football games and dirt track races and Jimmy Buffett concerts. I have seen the genuine delight he

takes at serving the perfect meal and keeping the books for baseball games. We have loved him back and there has been joy in the midst of all of it too. God's ways are hard, but they are also good. Don't read it and think he's Christ either. I may not be quiet, but I'm strong-willed and short tempered, and I did, in fact, get those things from my father. More than once in my childhood and adulthood, he apologized to one of us for things that were done or left undone. As his daughter, I certainly have to do the same all the time. That's what my dad has taught me. And he has taught me where to look when he falls short too. We are called to be imitators of Christ, but we cannot be Christ himself.

No matter who your earthly father or husband may be, whether they are wonderful or wretched or somewhere in between, our Father in heaven and Christ the husband of the church still offer a love more redeeming than even the one I knew in my childhood home. As voices try to give us instructions on how to be biblical men or women or families, let us not forget what Christ's love actually looks like. Christ's love is much more than a singular death. This love swallows the deaths of sin and sacrifice daily, so that we know new life each morning and may be unafraid to lay down our lives each day. The Husband of our Church is patient with you. The Father in Heaven is kind to you. Christ protects you and lives on this day for you. His love for you is never failing, never self-seeking, never keeping records of your wrongs, but always looking for the eternal paradise to come and hoping for the transformative grace of our Lord's mercy. All else may fade away—prophecies, tongues, tombs, and even our families—but this love our God holds for you will not fade away. This love will endure. That is what redeems us. That is what we look to. That is how Christ loves his church. That is how he loves you.





JOURNEY

One of my dearest friends asked me if I had an extra copy of "Good Grief", my go to book for dealing with grief. Good Grief was written by Granger E. Westberg, it's a great little book/guide on dealing with grief, I highly recommend it. I try to always have a couple of extra books around, just for that very purpose. A friend of theirs had expressed the "lostness" of adjusting to a loss. And so I was reminded of the reason I started writing these articles that you are now reading. So I'm going to go back to the beginning and revisit the journey that I have been on for the last 7 and a half years.

I apologize that I sometimes lose sight of the fact that for some of you this is a very new journey. Why journey? I really do see it that way. We are instantaneously thrown off in a completely foreign place and we must try to find our way to some place where we can once again begin to feel okay with ourselves. It's a long journey indeed, we take small uncertain steps in an unfamiliar direction. Sometimes we feel good with where we are going. Sometimes we feel like we are doing a Michael Jackson moonwalk. For some it's an all-out assault on our senses, especially if you are one who likes to plan your course. Life truly becomes a "one day at a time adventure".

I am no grief specialist, I'm a guy who has been incredibly blessed to have family and friends who have been very supportive. Not to discourage you but, this is a journey you must take largely on your own. Your situation is unique to you; no one else has your set of circumstances. But.... There are some things you can do to mitigate the load you are carrying.

There are some things that we can lean in on together to help on this journey. Everyone has lost someone dear to them. We've lost grandparents, aunts and uncles, mothers and fathers, brothers and sisters and even children. These are all hard and heavy burdens to carry. Again, your journey is your journey. And where you are on that journey is where you are, embrace it. You can choose to live in loneliness and heartbreak. Please don't take that path. It's too hard. It's too heavy. It will break you down. As soon as you can, push yourself back towards the surface. Reach out to others who have also lost. We understand where you are. We feel the utter pain that you feel and in fact your pain will remind us of our pain. Pain shared is definitely the way to go. Pick someone you trust and ask them to walk along side of you. In turn, you will be helping them to walk as well. One of the major reasons I write these articles is so

that you'll know I can share the load with you. I'm on that journey that you are now embarking on. I will listen to you. I can also give you names of people who are journeying as well, and who will also gladly listen to you. I have that hole in my life where my wife Cindy used to be. It's a real void. I've described that feeling as getting a deep cut on your arm, the wound heals the pain lessens but the scar remains. Every time you see that scar you'll remember the pain. What's important is that the pain does lessen. You'll actually look at the scar and smile remembering the love and good feelings that it represents.

The journey is hard. No one, and I mean no one, has an easy time of it. First and by far the triune God we worship is always seeking to travel with you. Sin is the reason we suffer these times. Sin in the corporate sense that is. Sin is a part of the world. God is our hope. Pray, pray and pray. Speak to God. Tell him when you are hurting. He wants us to bring that to him. He will be there to comfort. You have to open yourselves up to that comfort. Comfort, in my experience comes from sharing with you my hurts and joys concerning the journey. I want to be clear that it is okay to tell a fellow griever that you are feeling like crap, if you are. Because they will understand that you are not okay all the time. It will help you move down the road if you can be honest first with yourself and then with others. If you're having a bad day, then you're having a bad day. It's okay to have a bad day you can expect to have bad days. Seven and a half years and I still have bad days.

So in my first of a series of "circle back" journeys here are what I want you to hear. You don't have to go it alone. God wants to walk with you. Reach out your hand, he'll be there. He may choose to walk with you through one of us, your fellow griever. Don't isolate, don't self-medicate, don't forget you are loved.
